No one can use any electrical devices with the 2-prong cord attached to a 3-prong adapter. The device must have a commercial grade 3-prong electrical cord.

<u> CKFF Fair Guide</u>

Your fair guide with CKFF information is included in this mailing. Some reminders:

- * July 10th ALL 4-H/FFA exhibits must be entered online at ckff.fairentry.com
- * 4-H market livestock owner certification and drug withdrawal form **plus** feed and care record for market beef will be submitted with **Livestock Sale Intent to Sell Cards** following livestock shows. Please turn them in **promptly** following shows.
- * All 4-H/FFA market livestock entries will require the exhibitor's YQCA certificate number. Have that number handy when entering.
- * Most entries that are judged via conference judging will ask you to select a judging time. Please track those as you make selections for your family so as not to "double book". If you are not given the option to select judging times, a schedule will be made based on entries.

Youth for the Quality Care of Animals ***REQUIRED for ALL market livestock exhibitors***

Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) training is required for all 4-H/FFA members exhibiting market livestock - beef, sheep, swine, and meat goats - at the Central Kansas Free Fair and all youth exhibiting livestock at the Kansas State Fair and Kansas Junior Livestock Show. **This training may still be done online and must be completed by the CKFF July 10 entry deadline.** Complete the online request form at https://bit.ly/registeryqca ASAP to receive an online coupon code and instructions if you have not yet completed this training that is provided free of charge to Dickinson County 4-H members through a grant from ADM Cares.

Hints on Exhibiting Horticulture and Floriculture

K-State Research & Extension publications <u>Exhibiting Fruits and Vegetables</u> and <u>Preparing Cut Flowers for</u> <u>Exhibit</u> are excellent resources for 4-H members and adults that are planning to exhibit their vegetables or flowers. These publications are often used by judges as they evaluate fair entries and may be found by visiting: <u>http://www.ksre.ksu.edu/bookstore/</u>. The University of Illinois Extension has prepared a series of YouTube videos on how to prepare produce for the fair. Enter your kolaches made with King Arthur flour in the annual Special Baking Contest from 1:00 to 2:00 p.m., **Saturday, August 5,** in the Sterl Hall. Prizes are being sponsored by the King Arthur Flour Company with youth and adult divisions. Complete rules (i.e. must UPC from King Arthur flour!) are listed in the premium guide. The kolaches will be sold after the judging with the proceeds going to the Dickinson County 4-H Family Living Committee.

Reminders on Club Banners from Joetta Nagely, CKFF Banner Superintendent

-Colors: light on dark or dark on light.....when standing at a distance, letters or whole words can be lost if there is not a contrast in color.

-Cover several areas of 4-H don't duplicate by saying the same thing twice.

-Balance for the male and female audience make it appealing for both.

-No 3-D..... please check the rules in the fair paper.

-Lettering......not too small. Must be able to read from a distance.

-Background when using felt, be careful it stretches. Smooth edges look nicer.

-Enter your banner at the Tri-County Fair. Making a banner costs money and one more premium check will help pay for the supplies.

- Club name **may not** be on the front of the banner as part of the design.

2023 CKFF Theme: Sew It, Grow It, Show It

Foods and Clothing Labels

Labels are required in clothing and fiber arts exhibits. Exhibitors can make their own label on a piece of cloth with a permanent or laundry type marker. Labels should be about 3" x 2½" in size and include exhibitor name, class number and county. *The Food Preservation Labels changed in 2018 – be sure you are using the new labels.* For Foods items, there is a label template available for download at: http://www.kansas4-h.org/events-activities/fairs/kansas-state-fair/index.html under "Foods and Nutrition" and "Food Preservation." We have some printed and available at the office.

Food Safety of Frostings and Fillings

Research has been done and resources are available as you make decisions about frostings and fillings to use with fair exhibits. Food safety is essential and not all frostings and fillings are safe to store at room temperature. Resources on this topic may be found at: https://www.rrc.k-state.edu/judging/index.html. For food safety purposes, any entries with frostings and fillings must calculate the amount of sugar in the frosting/filling recipe only. ***NEW* Calculation must be attached to entry, or the placing will be lowered one ribbon when judged.** Frosting and fillings need to contain more than 65% sugar for safety.

CKFF State Fair Intent to Exhibit Form

Please have the Intent to Exhibit Form completed by **Wednesday, August 9th**. This online form (QR code) will be available to all eligible 2023 State Fair participants at the CKFF. If you do not receive one and are eligible to participate at the State Fair, please check with Extension Office staff or the CKFF information booth. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to make sure that this online form is submitted. This form will ensure proper data entry for the State Fair.

2023 CKFF Livestock Auction

- * Sale will be on **Monday, August 7th**, starting at **9:30 a.m.**
- * We will have rotation of the species. Grand and reserve champions will be sold first.
- * Drinks (tea and water) will be served by 4-H youth. The clubs are on a rotation schedule so that only four clubs each year are needed to serve drinks. Two to three 4-Hers per club are needed.
- * Sale Serving Schedule: 1^{st} shift - 8:30 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. 2^{nd} shift - 10:30 a.m. to end of sale

Hints for CKFF Beef Exhibitors

- Stall Cards need to be up for each animal by Thursday (you can get them at the weigh-in table by the scales)
- The feed alley is where all of the hay, straw, feed, etc. should go, not behind the cattle
- Blocking chutes should be down after the show and removed from the cattle area
- Keep the stalls clean and the animals clean while in their stalls
- Have your animals tied correctly and use a neck rope
- Water the animals extra when it's very hot
- After feeding your animals, pull the feed pans so they are not getting stepped on
- If you pull your animals out to feed them around the trees, don't walk away you need to attend to them until they are done and clean up behind them

Remember the goal is a safe and clean area to work in as well as a nice place for fair visitors. The beef superintendents award an individual herdsman award to one person that does an outstanding job during the fair taking care of their animals as well as helping their club try to win the stall award. Please see beef superintendents Roger Forsyth or Greg Acheson with questions.

STEM Opportunity - SunPowered Student Challenge - Rural Electric Cooperative Competition

The Kansas Electric Cooperatives – consisting of the 26 Rural Electric Cooperatives across Kansas – are beginning a high school solar competition for teams of 2 to 4 students. While preparing for the competition, the students will learn about the appropriate sizing of solar installations, how to properly select a site for solar, understanding how the angles of the Sun change through the year, and the impact of cloud cover on solar production. The team of students should consist of varying personalities and skill sets, as the competition will require the application of science and math, the ability to present solutions to a panel of adults, and solving challenges presented during the day of the statewide competition in Topeka. Competing in this event is a great way for students to prepare for a possible degree or career in the solar industry. Multiple institutions in Kansas offer degrees and certifications that lead to employment. Many of the RECs across the state are sponsoring teams to participate. Their sponsorship covers the cost of the materials kit (\$1,000) needed to prepare and participate in the state competition. If your 4-H'ers are interested in participating, the cost for students to participate is very low (only needing to pay a \$200 competition registration fee for the team, if your local REC is sponsoring the materials kit). Record keeping and Project Reporting are valuable skills taught to members of the Kansas 4-H program. Members are encouraged to keep a permanent record of all 4-H and non-4-H experience and are encouraged to summarize their project experiences on the Kansas 4-H Project Report Form for project recognition. To help you through this process, please refer to the Guide to Kansas 4-H Project Recognition. Couple of items to make note of:

- Youth may choose to use either record keeping option: a.) the fillable PDF Project report forms or b.) the online ZBooks software
- The Permanent Record is included in ZBooks. If you choose to keep records with ZBooks, do not feel like you have to transfer over all of your previous years' activities into the online Permanent Record. Start with this year and attach it to your previous document.

Please keep these tips handy, but remember the **Fair Premium Guide is the official reference.** The Premium Guide is available online at <u>https://www.chisholmtrail.k-state.edu/fairs/ckff/CKFF.html</u> This "Family Fair Guide" is designed to help your family prepare for the fair. Please review it carefully for rule changes, entry deadlines, judging schedules, and other important information.

Best of luck in preparing your fair exhibits! Please feel free to contact our office if you have any questions.

*The CKFF Premium Guide will only be available electronically this year. Please print it if you would like a hard copy.

Ways to Enhance Your Fair Experience

- Keep a positive attitude, help others, and have fun.
- Keep livestock stalls neat and presentable.
- Think safety first at the fairgrounds. Keep livestock securely tied.
- Watch out for all fair visitors, especially children.
- Be considerate of other 4-Hers and animals at all times.
- If you have a concern, talk to the proper division superintendent. If the matter cannot be resolved, then speak to an Extension Agent.
- Youth and parents are encouraged to submit <u>in writing</u> signed suggestions for future fairs. These may be left at the Fair Information Office or the CKFF Office. The CKFF Board has a grievance policy that must be followed for complaints.
- Read your CKFF Fair Premium Guide.

*Exhibit Release – All 4-H and Open Class Exhibits will be released Sunday, 3 p.m. CKFF will not be responsible for exhibits left after 4 p.m. Premium Checks – 4-H and Open Class checks will be available after August 30th, at the Extension Office. Checks must be picked up within 30 days and cashed within 90 days of the close of the fair. No premium checks will be mailed. After 90 days, any premium checks not cashed will be considered a donation to the Central Kansas Free Fair. **Livestock Sale Checks** – Will be available as soon as the animals pass slaughter inspection and have been proved to comply with all CKFF rules. (For livestock sold in the premium sale and any other animals sold for slaughter.)

REMINDER: You must show proof of thanking the buyer(s) before you will receive your livestock sale check. Please do this right after the fair.

4-Hers must still refer to individual department for entry and exhibit information. If there is a discrepancy, the Fair Premium Guide is the final word.

CHECKLISTS

- Market Animals (Beef, Goat, Sheep, Swine) and Breeding Animals
 - *Review all special instructions in department*
 - On-line entry using FairEntry (will need tag/tattoo/ear notches and breed)
 - Specify class number and breed on-line
 - Owner Certification of Market Animals will be included with Intent to Sell cards. Make sure cards are completed immediately following livestock shows
 - Enter showmanship
 - All 4-H/FFA market livestock entries will require the exhibitor's YQCA certificate number. Have that number handy when entering.

• Equine

- Review all special instructions in department
- On-line entry using FairEntry for each class you wish to enter (halter, pleasure, western horsemanship, showmanship, all timed events, and horseless horse showmanship) (*will need common name*)

• Dog

- *Review all special instructions in department*
- Must have attended at least 3 dog project meetings for showmanship/obedience and 3 project meetings for agility to be eligible
- On-line entry using FairEntry for each class you wish to enter (showmanship, obedience, agility, and rally) (*will need name, size, and dominant breed*)

• Cat

- Review all special instructions in department
- Must have attended at least one county cat meeting to be eligible
- On-line entry using FairEntry (will need animal's name)
- \circ Include name of cat
- Bucket Calf
 - *Review all special instructions in department*
 - On-line entry using FairEntry for both Bucket Calf and Decorator Bucket Calf (will need animal's name)
- Dairy/Dairy Goat
 - Review all special instructions in department
 - On-line entry using FairEntry, (will need breed, animal name, birthdate, and tag number)
 - Enter showmanship on-line also

- > Judging times will be assigned based on pre-entries
- Each garment/item must have a 4-H clothing label sewn into the article prior to judging. A limited number are available at the Extension Office. When the supply is gone, members will need to make their own.
- Wool Garment Competition is open to any 4-Her enrolled in a clothing, knitting, or crochet project who has constructed a garment with at least 60% wool fiber content. No pre-entry required; tell the judge your entry is eligible for the wool garment awards.
- > Other Important Clothing Note <u>Only constructed clothing will be exhibited at the fair.</u>

- Bring food entries to conference judging at scheduled time on Wednesday. Sign up for conference judging times when you pre-enter at ckff.fairentry.com
- > Check classes and rules in the Fair Premium Guide.
- > Approximately 5 minutes is allotted to each exhibit.
- 4-H leader and/or parents are welcome to sit with the 4-Her and listen to the judge's comments. Please allow the 4-Her to do the talking.
- Educational Exhibits (nutrition on a 3'x4' tri-fold display/notebook) will be judged at the same time food is judged. 4-Hers are encouraged to make an educational exhibit; you can also exhibit 3 food items and 1 flop.

FOOD EXHIBITING TIPS

FREEZING – Freezing baked products before the fair is acceptable. Be sure they are completely thawed before the judging. Use good storage containers; air tight plastic containers are recommended. Thaw baked goods slowly (in the refrigerator) in the container, bag, or wrap in which they are frozen. This minimizes moisture loss.

BAKING TIPS

- > Practice making baked entries several times before the final preparation of your fair entry.
- Start early so you can improve your skills and make changes to recipes.
- > Drop cookies are dropped from a spoon onto a cookie sheet. They may or may not be flattened.
- ▶ Bar cookies may be cake-like or compact and chewy. They are cut into bars when cool.
- > Do not overmix muffin or cupcake batter; overmixing causes tunnels.
- Foam cakes should have a rough, slightly cracked top crust; use week old eggs, allow egg whites to come to room temperature before beating. Exhibit in upright position with top crust showing.
- > Use solid shortening to grease pans rather than oil or spray.

- ▶ Whole wheat products are to contain at least 50% whole wheat flour.
- Quick breads do not contain yeast.
- Grease muffin pans and quick bread pans on the bottom only to avoid a "fry line" around the top edge of the baked product.
- Use hydrogenated shortening instead of butter or margarine in cake frostings. It has a melting point of 127° F and produces a better product in hot weather.
- Follow guidance on Frostings and Fillings provided at <u>https://www.rrc.k-state.edu/judging/index.html.</u> Calculations must be made prior to judging or you will be dropped one ribbon placing.

- Adult and Youth Divisions and must use King Arthur Flour and provide UPC label from bag or opened bag of King Arthur Flour
- > 4-Hers can enter the Special Baking Competition (using King Arthur Flour)
- See Open Class Foods Division for details.
- Entries are due Saturday, August 5th from 1:00 2:00 p.m. Judging begins at 2:00 p.m.
- > The entries will be sold to benefit the family living committee following judging.

LIVESTOCK

- **Beef** Proof of breed is required to show in purebred classes.
- Beef No health certificate required. No brucellosis testing will be required for breeding animals, unless they
 originate from out of state.
- Equine Must be checked in Wednesday, August 2.
- Equine A coggins test is recommended.
- All market livestock exhibitors must have completed Youth for the Quality Care of Animals training to sell in premium sale.

- Ask questions!

You will need to work at least <u>4 hours</u> to receive a fair pass good for one night of grandstand entertainment. Your pass will be given to you by your department superintendent **AFTER** you have completed your work assignments. We are counting on you and if there is any reason you cannot work at your assigned time, please call the Extension Office or the superintendent of your assigned department to plan for another work time.

Most livestock helpers should report on Wednesday shortly before 3:00 p.m. for check-in times. Other departments, please be there just before the check-in or judging times. Check in with your department superintendent as soon as you arrive.

For Fair Entry, Winners Walkway, Foods, and Photography divisions, the superintendents of those projects will contact the 4-H Helpers prior to fair to set up a work schedule for fair week.



Favorite Foods Show

Theme 2023: Charcuterie

Please register by **July 10** via Fair Entry (ckff.fairentry.com)

The word "charcuterie" is a French word that describes a shop that sells cured pork products such as salami and ham as well as cheeses, olives, nuts, crackers, dried fruits and other condiments. The best part about charcuterie boards is that they're totally



customizable! You can switch up the components based on the occasion, the season, or simply what your guests will like best. The Favorite Foods Show challenge this year is to create a healthy food arrangement giving attention to texture, balance of sweet, salty, and savory, while including pops of color.

Come join us for the Favorite Foods Show on **July 28th at 5pm in Sterl Hall** (Abilene Fairgrounds). Participation for this event is open to enrolled Chisholm Trail District 4-Hers. Enrollment in the foods and nutrition project is NOT required. The public is invited to join us for our finale charcuterie board tasting.

Rules

This event is a presentation of a **themed board**, **tablecloth**, **menu** that includes a **diagram of the** board, and recipe for the homemade item.

- Items on the board may be labeled.
- This will be a conference judging experience with participants prepared to discuss their menu and • presentation choices with the judge.
- Each board should serve eight.
- At least one of the items included on the board must be made by the participant with the recipe provided.
- Please plan to arrive at 4:45pm to set up your table-setting and start the event at 5pm.

Create a board that you would share with family or friends that meets the requirements assigned to your age division:

Juniors (age 9 and under) = fruits, veggies, dips

Intermediates (age 10-13) = dips, cheeses, crackers, bread

Seniors (age 14+) = Full Board including vegetable/fruit, bread/crackers, cheese/other protein, and one additional item

-Plan a healthy food arrangement giving attention to texture, balance of sweet, salty, and savory, while including pops of color.

-Your board should include eight servings.

-Bring a copy of the recipe for the homemade item and the cost per serving (a digital copy MUST be sent electronically to mkanguiano@ksu.edu for the Favorite Food Show cookbook).

-Be prepared to answer questions during the conference judging as to how you chose your charcuterie arrangement, what makes it healthy, or if not so healthy, how it complements the rest of the menu. How could you make it a healthier option? Also think about any food safety considerations that would be relevant. We are encouraging participants to update their recipes with food safety instructions, such as

"wash your hands..." as the first direction. For more information, see the <u>Safe Recipe Style Guide</u> for guidance.

-Tables will be provided-- (your display will be made on one end of a six-foot table.... about the size of a card table). When planning your display, think about how you would present your board and how it would be served. Make sure to include required serving items (example: napkin or plate, tongs, spoon, etc.) as well as an appropriate table covering.

-Please dress in typical 4-H conference judging attire.

-Allow 15 minutes of judging...The participant and the judge will be allowed at the table during judging. Once your judging is complete, your picture will be taken to assist the judge as well as for promotion and a "cookbook" that will be complied and available later in the summer. You will be asked to clean up your area at the end of the event.

*Please bring enough for 8 people, as we will have a sampling afterwards. (We will provide tea and water, as well as plates, etc.)

While the judge is tallying, participants will be able to do a quick tour with the crowd to answer questions. Younger participants can have help from their parents on the tour part, as we don't want to prevent youth from participating if they are afraid to talk.
